

Inverclyde Windfarm Fund Impact Report 2023/24



Introduction

Inverclyde Community Fund SCIO is a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation Registration (SC051145) which award small grants to local community groups and voluntary organisations in Inverclyde.

In 2023/24, grants were distributed through the Inverclyde Windfarm Fund (IWF). The fund is a partnership between Inverclyde Renewables LLP and Inverclyde Community Fund (ICF). Grants are awarded to third sector organisations and groups that support and promote at least one of the following objectives:


- Environmental
- Renewable energy
- Energy efficiency
- Sustainable development
- Charitable
- Educational
- Community
- Sport and recreation
- · General community amenity schemes

The Board decided to allocate three pots of IWF funding, each with a different focus, but meeting the fund objectives:

- 1. Inverclyde Windfarm Fund: Grants of up to £1,000 for organisations with an annual income of under £250,000. These were awarded through an open application process.
- 2. Sustainable Development Grants: Launched in August 2023, we accepted applications for grants of up to £5,000 from larger organisations and individuals to deliver projects with environmental or sustainable development outcomes.
- 3. Winter Grants: In November 2023 we invited organisations tackling the cost of living crisis and helping to reduce social isolation in Inverclyde over the winter period to apply for grants of £2,000.

Awarding a total of £78,700, projects supported cover a wide range of activities. From growing food, getting young people involved in sport, and support for socially isolated people, to music and arts projects, emergency first aid training, and food banks helping those most in need in our communities.

Grant Examples

Blooming Inverkip - £1,000

Blooming Inverkip is an inclusive volunteer led gardening group that runs from the Inverkip Community Hub. They were awarded £1,000 in June 2023 to create a new greenhouse area, and set up a sustainable power supply for the garden.

The group have purchased solar panels to fit to the existing shed roof. The enhanced lighting is energy efficient, and will allow for use of the garden during darker evenings. The greenhouse area is well on its way to completion and will be used during the 2024 growing season.

As a result of the award, the group were able to be more creative and adventurous with regards to the extension of the area and have since gone on to secure additional funding from another funder.





Port Glasgow New Parish Church - £1,000



Supported with grant of £1,000 in July 2023, Port Glasgow New Parish Church set up a social enterprise café called "Chatty Cafe". Run entirely by volunteers, the free cafe meets every Friday.

The purpose of the cafe is to help those within the community who feel socially isolated and in need of a warm meal and companionship.

The cafe has seen the number of attendees increase each week and the Church is focusing on more advertising to reach even more people.

Compassionate Grit - £1,000

Compassionate Grit were awarded £1,000 in December 2023 to provide a series of basketball sessions for young people in Inverclyde. The programme was designed to promote physical activity, teamwork, and community engagement among participants. The grant allowed the purchase of equipment and training materials such as basketballs, bibs and first aid kits, along with hall rental costs.

In total, six sessions were held engaging 32 young people from the local community, providing them with a positive outlet for physical activity and personal growth. As part of the programme, Compassionate Grit also worked alongside another local basketball group, sharing learning and experiences.

The grant also allowed Compassionate Grit to expand their reach and enhance the quality of their offerings, contributing to longer-term sustainability and growth for the organisation.





Man On! Inverciyde - £1,000

Man On! Invercive were award £1,000 in August 2023 to run Talk On women's group, a support group for survivors of domestic abuse. Six women were supported through the group, taking part in a course covering topics including self-care, housing and benefits.

The group ran as a pilot project and Man On! Inverclyde have since linked with other local women's charities to begin plans to roll out the course to other groups.

The grant was also a learning opportunity for the organisation staff who gained experience in the funding process, from application through to project delivery.

Lyle Gateway - £2,000 (Winter Grants)

As part of the Winter Grants programme, Lyle Gateway received £2,000 to host a Christmas Day lunch and Singing for Wellbeing sessions.

The Christmas Day lunch was attended by 37 people who enjoyed a three course lunch surrounded by friendly faces. Helping to alleviate the feelings of social isolation, the group included three Ukrainian ladies whose families and friends are miles away in Ukraine.

The Singing for Wellbeing sessions ran weekly with 30 attendees benefiting from increased wellbeing and reduced isolation.



Starter Packs Inverclyde - £1,000

Working closely with local social work, women's aid and homelessness services, Starter Packs provide a range of basic household items to people who have been homeless moving into a new home in Inverclyde. They were awarded £1,000 in September 2023 which helped to create 52 Adult Packs and 54 Children's hygiene packs.

Inverkip (Morton) Walking Football - £1,000



In June 2023, Inverkip (Morton) Walking Football were awarded £1,000 to purchase kit and equipment for the team to use at training and tournaments. This amount was match funded by the players.

The club aim to encourage physical exercise and social interaction in the over 50s by providing an inclusive and accessible activity. The club works with local health groups and charities to promote health awareness. They work closely with Morton in the Community and have taken part in local and international tournaments.

Sustainable Development Grants

total awarded through SDGs

The Sustainable Development Grants (SDG) launched in August 2023 and provided grants of up to £5,000 for larger organisations and individuals to deliver projects with a specific focus on environmental or sustainable development outcomes.

Projects supported through the SDGs were working towards specific priorities:

- The Environment
- Renewable Energy
- Energy Efficiency
- Sustainable Development (including Community/Society, Economy or Culture)

The following Sustainable Development Goals have been supported directly by the awarded SDGs and the work of the organisations supported more broadly:



Wellington Allotment Gardens Association - £3,000

Wellington Allotment Gardens Association (WAGA) facilitate allotments and raised beds which are used by local groups where they can grow their own produce and provide educational opportunities.

In response to previous year experiences with extreme weather events, WAGA recognised the need to secure their supplies of water against fluctuating rainfall levels and establish a water saving strategy. They were awarded a grant of £3,000 which is being put towards the development of a rainwater harvesting installation which will not only help secure water supplies during extreme heat events, but also reduce flood risk by lower water run off.

Sustainable Development Goals supported:



Belville Community Garden Trust, £4,500

Belville Community Garden Trust operate within one of the most deprived areas within Inverclyde and act to support local community development. An important aspect of their work is in widening accessibility for those with physical disabilities and aim to reduce social isolation among the older generation, 'New Scots' and the recovery community. Through consultation, the group identified a want for the provision of practical workshops themed around 'money saving' and sustainable behaviours.

The group have used their grant of £4,500 towards the provision of sewing and knitting classes (an extension of a group that already meets) and hosting of bike repair cafes (again an extension of their repair service)."

Sustainable Development Goals supported:



Inverclyde Shed, £5,000

Inverclyde Shed has been an incredibly successful endeavour and as a result, has seen substantial growth. This is demonstrated by their successful communityasset transfer of a former Inverclyde Council building, which now operates as a Hub to deliver their activities. As part of this, they identified a use for their new growing space to continue growing during Winter and allow them to continue to supply the members of Inverclyde, local charities and food pantries with produce.

A grant of £5,000 contributed to the establishment of an 'aeroponic' growing system for growing vegetables by irrigating roots in a nutrient dense mist. The project will also be an opportunity for other local groups, and those further afield, to see this new technology in operation.

Sustainable Development Goals supported:



Youth STEM, £5,000

Youth STEM 2030 is a youth-led social enterprise which is based in Inverclyde and since launching in March 2020, has supported over 2500 young people across the globe as 'changemakers'.

Although many young people often want to make a difference towards tackling Climate Change, they often don't possess the knowledge, skill or tools required to take meaningful action. To address this, Youth STEM 2030 developed a 10-week programme which a select number of young people from Invercive would take part in.

During the programme, the young people were mentored by experts through a sustainability-oriented curriculum to not only further their knowledge on this subject, but also improve their critical thinking, research and design and science communication skills. They then used this knowledge to undertake a final project.

Sustainable Development Goals supported:



Wellington Park Bowling Club, £3,000

Wellington Park Bowling Club is a lawn green bowling club based in Greenock which operates across the Summer and Autumn seasons and provides people with the opportunity to engage in the sport through many events.

As part of the growth and continued operation of the club, Wellington Park Bowling Club has a desire to increase their offering to the local community beyond the game itself. Part of this growth plan included the creation of a community garden of two to three allotments which would be intended to be used for growing of vegetables, fruits and apple trees (among others).

Winter Grants awarded

The Winter Grants are awarded over the winter months to groups who support the most vulnerable in our communities who are at risk of social isolation. This year, they also focused on supporting those people struggling with the cost of living crisis.

Applications were invited from organisations that are known to ICF who have experience of delivering this type of work. An effort was made to target areas across Inverclyde with the greatest need of support.

Organisations invited to apply were asked to complete a short, light touch application with a fast turnaround to ensure support reached communities as quickly as possible.

Progress and Future Plans

2023/24 was the third year of the Inverclyde Windfarm Fund and awareness of the fund continues to grow with new groups applying each year.

Fund Promotion

Looking ahead to 2024/25, we will continue to publicise the fund through local news, online via our website and social media, as well as through word of mouth from previous grantees. We have close connections with both CVS Inverclyde and Inverclyde Council who help to promote the grants.

Responsive Grantmaking

As we all continue to face challenges linked with the ongoing cost of living crisis, local groups are uniquely placed to support our communities in Inverclyde. As a fast and responsive grant maker, at ICF we are able to award grants based on emerging needs. The Winter Grants in particular are extremely successful at quickly getting support out to groups who see an increased demand during a particularly difficult time of year for many people.

Through the Sustainable Development Grants, organisations and individuals have the opportunity to try something new and pilot projects.

Improved Applications

In 2024/25 we will be moving a more streamlined application process with a new database system and online application form. As a volunteer-run organisation, the new system will improve efficiency and make monitoring and reporting easier.

The updated application form has fewer questions and makes it clearer what we want applicants to tell us about their work. The hope is that this will reduce the time taken to complete the application and increase the quality of applications submitted.
